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

When to Visit: Best Times and Seasons

To make the most of your Yala adventure, timing is crucial.

Best Months: The park is at its peak during the dry season from February to June, when water sources shrink, and animals congregate near waterholes, making sightings more frequent.

Optimal Time of Day: Safaris are conducted in the early morning (6:00 AM) and late afternoon (2:30 PM), the best times to see wildlife in action as animals are most active during these cooler parts of the day.

Seasonal Highlights: Yala is open year-round and the monsoon season (October to January) transforms the landscape into a lush, verdant haven. It's a quieter time for visitors but equally beautiful for those who appreciate the serenity of nature.


