For Sri Lankan author Ciara Mandulee Mendis, travel is more than a pastime—it’s a path to rediscovery.

Tea, in fact, runs like a golden thread through her travels: Singapore's frothy Teh Tarik, India's spiced brews, China's delicate green teas, and Egypt's aromatic blends all find a place in her narrative.

Beyond landscapes and flavors, the book offers the perspective of a female Sri Lankan traveler navigating spaces often dominated by male voices. Ciara writes honestly about the joys and challenges of being a woman on the road—whether mastering new transport systems, blending into local markets, or ensuring safety while traveling alone. Her reflections extend beyond her personal growth to reveal the historical and cultural connections between Sri Lanka and the places she visited. Along the way, readers are reminded that travel need not be extravagant; with careful planning, curiosity, and resilience, the dream of exploring the world is within reach.
