Esala Perahera

The Temple of the Tooth Relic in Kandy is revered by the Buddhists of the island, marked by regular pilgrimages to 'Dalada Maligawa.' Perhaps the most vibrant tradition of all time performed on behalf of the Sacred Relic, Dalada Perahera (Pageant of the Tooth Relic) spans the month of August and culminating on the full moon Poya day.



Esala Perahera is a pageant that reflects the rich heritage of the country.

Five days of Kumbal Perahera – a modest pageant with tuskers and drummers – are said to drive away ill will. And then, the Randoli Perahera parades the hill capital for five days, amidst the rhythmic beat of drums and the musical notes of Hevisi. Maha Randoli Perahera, the central and final pageant that illuminates the streets takes place on the August full moon day, as thousands of onlookers murmur ‘Sadhu Sadhu’ in worship. Whips lash and fireballs spin, creating a magnificent sight. Traditional dancers in elaborate costumes step lightly on their feet, moving the procession forward. The caparisoned tusker, adorned with precious stones and vivid lights and bearing the Sacred Relic, is the most anticipated sight of the entire procession. As the revered tusker approaches, the air thrums with fervent calls of ‘Sadhu,’ a mark of steadfast faith that devotees have towards the Sacred Tooth Relic.

Feast of Our Lady of Madhu

The Shrine of Our Lady of Madhu in Mannar is a holy site of utmost reverence. As August draws near, thousands of devotees camp in the holy grounds in anticipation of the magnificent Feast of Our Lady of Madhu celebrating the Assumption of the Virgin Mary.



The procession dedicated to Our Lady of Madhu is venerated by devotees of diverse faiths.

Festivities begin with the hoisting of the flag and span across ten days. Novenas for Mother Mary are held daily. Mass is held in Sinhala and Tamil, reflecting the harmony of the island. Grand Feast of Assumption of Our Lady to Heaven is revered with a High Mass and a procession. The statue of Our Lady, decorated in the calm colors of blue and white is taken in a procession amidst calls of 'Hail Mary!' Holy hymns fill the air as thousands of worshippers recite in harmony.

Mahotsavam of Nallur Kandaswamy Kovil

Nallur Kandaswamy Kovil in Jaffna is a famous and vibrant Kovil with elaborate gopurams and detailed artistry, its history dating back to 1734. Dedicated to Lord

Murugan, also known as Lord Kandaswamy and God Skanda, the Kovil celebrates its annual festival in August. Hindus from all over the world, as well as devotees of diverse faiths flock to Nallur, as the festival initiates with flag hoisting. The vibrant festivities continue with Mancham when the idols of God Skanda and his consorts are taken in procession. Ther (Chariot festival), the culmination of the month long celebration, is a trance of devotion. The idols of God Skanda and his consorts are carried on a silver 'Simhasana' (throne) upto the chariot, which is then drawn by the strength of manpower fueled by devotion. The day of Ther sees Nallur becoming a sea of devotees, singing sacred chants in utmost veneration.
